Affirm the \$600,000 SECA Fund allocation to the General Fund to pay back the Carillon Line of Credit over the next 3 years.

Brad Bobosky, 948 Anne Road, reviewed past comments made by the Mayor and Council regarding culture in Naperville. He stated that there are other ways to close the budget gap and that Council should not divert funds from SECA.

Council reviewed the Carillon funding history, stated that by allocating the funds from SECA it removes the debt payment from the taxpayer, and said that the reallocation was agreed to at a workshop.

Council stated that the Carillon is a cultural amenity and SECA dollars should go to brick and mortar amenities rather than to events and clubs. It clarified that because the Carillon is a cultural amenity the money is being used for its intended purpose, it just also happens to be closing a debt. Council then questioned where the city would get the money to pay the debt in three years if the proposed magnitude of fund reallocation is not done now.

Council discussed continuing to hold five vacant positions open, paying down the debt at a slower pace, or using fund balance from replacement funds.

Wehrli moved to affirm the \$600,000 SECA Fund allocation to the General Fund to pay back the Carillon Line of Credit over the next three years. Second, Furstenau.
