Chirico explained the history of the proposed change and the Liquor Commission review process.

Council discussed the appropriateness of selling liquor near a school or day care, where the 100' measurement should start, whether the definition should be changed.

Obarski moved to pass Ordinance No. 15-117, amending Section 1 and 11 of Chapter 3, Title 3 of the Naperville Municipal Code modifying location proximity restrictions for liquor licensed establishments to remove "daycare centers" from the "school" definition and add an exemption for establishments where the sale of liquor is not the principal business. Council stated that a compelling reason to mirror the state definition has not been presented and discussed the need to protect day cares and schools, not put the public at risk, the impact of zoning requirements on businesses, and the need for commercial businesses to take precedence.

Obarski made a Motion in Substitution to exempt liquor establishments from the 100 foot school/daycare restriction if their primary business is not the sale of liquor. Second, Coyne.
