Foley explained that the landlord must pass several inspection criteria to be permitted in the program, if the landlord does not pass inspection criteria they will not be required to participate in the program, and that landlords are not mandated to accept the applicant even when inspection criteria is met. Foley also explained that landlords cannot refuse to accept vouchers without a valid reason and that the proposed definition strikes a balance between protecting the interests of private property owners/landlords and protecting the rights of potential tenants to have equal opportunity to secure housing.

Bob Fischer, Naperville, spoke in favor of the proposed definition of legal source of income.

Council discussed the structure of the Housing Advisory Commission (HAC), voting record, and open meetings compliance and deliberations. Council also discussed affordable housing stock and whether the change will impact the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program.

Council further deliberated about the current lack of collaboration in the program, participation of other municipalities, the appropriateness of an amendment to the definition, impact to landlords and renters, waiting for the federal government to mandate participation, and possibly placing a zoning area or district restriction on the program.

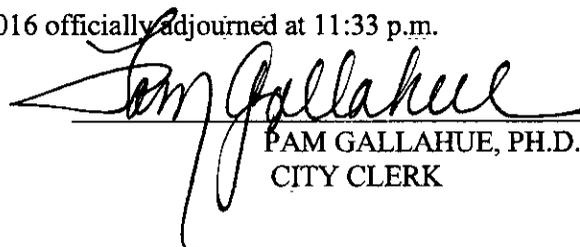
