Bette Kalina, 1439 Crystal Court, thanked Council for supporting the Municipal Band and for the Central Park beautifications.

**E2 Kids Teen Rider Grants**

Tiffany Stephens, 2815 Cedar Glade Drive, asked Council to reconsider the allocation of grant fund to the Kids Teen Rider Program.

**E3 Public Safety - Radios**

Bill Eagan, 513 Alexandria Drive, questioned the effectiveness of the new radio system and asked that the system be made a formal agenda item for discussion and input.

Krieger stated that the system is not operating functionally, that last week staff met with Harris representatives, new antennas will be delivered, that all questions can be e-mailed to him or Dan Voiland, and nothing will be paid until the system is acceptable.

**E4 Springbrook Prairie**

Joe Suchecki, 2416 Kingsley Drive, thanked Council for their vote to deny the tower.

**E5 Smart Grid Initiative**

Stephanie Hastings, 3835 Caine Court, supports the project and the technology and encouraged those with concerns to continue to do research.

Krieger said an additional test to verify frequency of transmission has been added to the pilot program as a result of resident concerns.

Lisa Rooney, 2690 Wabash Court, supports technology that is safe and tested within Naperville. She stated that the PR firm could not answer many resident questions and urged Council to stop the install in order to research and test.

Krieger said the city is following standard protocol regarding installation and that the committee will be discussing questions she submitted at their March 18 meeting. He also said that an Open House at the ESC will be held to discuss concerns and share knowledge.

Curran explained that meters have not yet been delivered and that testing did happen prior to the DOE application to determine the appropriateness of city use.

Council explained that information is being collected which focuses on a mitigation strategy for wireless transmitters.

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**E5**      Smart Grid Initiative Continued

David Bendis, 2207 Mercer Court, displayed an RF output chart and said that the report is based on estimated data.

Kim Bendis, 2207 Mercer Court, outlined her nursing training that qualifies her to speak to the hazards of Smart meters.

Jennifer Stahl, 1427 Westglen Drive, urged Council to change plans for Smart grid initiative because of the mounting evidence that the meters will bring problems to people and property.

Michael Anderson, 1611 Frost Lane, sells technology that goes into Smart meters, and urged Council to be sure all the testing is complete and accurate inside and outside the home.

Joanne St. Yves, 2315 Lexington, discussed the Seletun study which found that EMF needs strong preventative actions, public exposure standards, and recommends against wireless, Smart grid type technology.

Amy Coffman Phillips, 418 W. Franklin Avenue, supports the Smart grid technology initiative.

Council discussed the RF chart details and stated that the numbers aren't as far apart as represented, that an Open House will allow for dialogue with residents, stated that the timeline is on the city's website, and that actions taken on this project have been very transparent.

She clarified that the proposed text amendment only addresses financial institutions and recommends that they be located on the second floor or above.

Wehrli moved to pass Ordinance No. 11-043, amending Title 6 (zoning regulations ) of the Municipal Code pertaining to financial institutions only in the B4 (Downtown Core) District. Second, Boyajian.

Susan McNeal-Bulak, 305 W. Jefferson, discussed points from the Executive Summary including: maintaining a compact downtown core, to value the existing residential neighbors, to preserve the small downtown character. She said that the height recommendations in the north downtown special planning area north of Benton are inconsistent with the spirit of the 2030 Plan.

Bob Colby, 888 W. Benton, is concerned with the north downtown special planning area.

Dr. Bob Buckman, 1325 Heatherton and Naperville Homeowners Confederation, asked Council to consider the concept that increased height of the new buildings equals increased traffic. He suggested building height of 43' on Washington between Franklin and Douglas and 50' between Benton and Franklin.

Mary Derwinski, 420 W. Spring, is concerned with the plan's building height recommendation of 60' and asked Council to limit building height west of Washington Street to the same size on the east side of Washington Street.

Veronica Porter, 325 W. Benton, discussed the variance process and asked Council to maintain the 43' height limit.

Council discussed the building height on Washington and a possible cavernous effect with the recommended height, reviewed portions of the plan that do not support 60' buildings, and suggested a better transition.

Laff clarified that this does not amend the SSA boundary, that height restrictions are being proposed for the downtown for the first time, and explained height recommendations were made because the area is seen as an extension of the downtown core and a transition into the downtown that is sensitive to the adjacent uses. She said that any development review/approval will take the topography of the land into consideration.

Wehrli moved to amend Section 1-11-1 (Comprehensive Plan) of the Municipal Code to adopt Naperville Downtown 2030 and the Supplemental Downtown Design Standards and to not allow heights to exceed 43' on all of Washington frontage and 50' on Main Street between Benton and Franklin. Second, Boyajian.

Furstenau made a Motion in Substitution to table amending Section 1-11-1 (Comprehensive Plan) of the Municipal Code to adopt Naperville Downtown 2030 and the Supplemental Downtown Design Standards to April 6, 2011. Second, Krause.

Ordinance No. 11-044, Increasing the cap for Class D licenses

Allen Peterson, 1310 Danada Court, clarified that more than 70% of sales are from boutique wines, however a small selection of spirits and craft beers are sold at his locations as well.

Brad Jiwani, 1474 E. Chicago and owner of Solo Liquors, asked how a second Class D liquor license can be located in a mall less than 100,000 sf.

Ely explained that Council is considering increasing Class D licenses in shopping centers between 60,000 and 100,000 sf to 14.

Council said that the process of how licenses are issued should continue to be examined, that negative effects on the community may still occur as a result of package liquor stores, but that the public does not seem to object to the increase of Class D license.

Boyajian moved to pass Ordinance no. 11-044, amending Title 3 (Business and License Regulations), Chapter 3 (Liquor and tobacco control), Section 13 (Number of Liquor Licenses Issued), of the Naperville Municipal Code increasing the cap for Class D Licenses from 13 to 14. Second, Wehrli.

TAG DAY HOURS

Council discussed the increased need to donate to charitable organizations, what is different from the previous ordinance, the disruption to traffic when solicitors are in the streets, and asked what caused the reduction in complaints.

English explained that complaints may have been reduced because the hours were changed from "dawn to dusk" to a set time frame when solicitation is allowed and that safety vests are now required which identify city-approved solicitors. He said that the record of the complaints does not distinguish between those solicitors in the street and those going door-to-door in the neighborhoods.

English stated that soliciting is not allowed on major thoroughfares and must be at a signaled intersection. He said that the Clerk's Office maintains a map which depicts where solicitation is allowed and where it is restricted.

Wehrli moved to direct staff to draft an ordinance changing the tag day hours from the current 10:00 a.m. start time to 7:00 a.m. Second, Hinterlong.

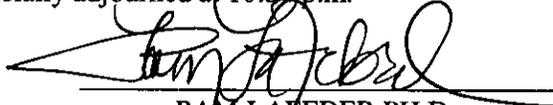
