Council discussed that they are currently not interested in extending this program citywide now but may be at a later time, the option of having professional waste haulers review and comment prior to the letting of the RFP, and the long-standing issue of waste generation in the Central Business District

Van Vooren discussed the 15-month moratorium between contract execution and the beginning of service, explained that this agenda item will allow the city to evaluate a price and explore the market for refuse collection and then make a determination of the appropriateness of the venture

Patrick Skarr of 55 S Main Street and the Naperville Chamber thanked Council for removing the citywide option and spoke about the number of people that are skilled in downtown waste management and asked that other groups be considered

Bob Pfister of 1660 Hubbard, Batavia, and National Solid Waste Management Association (NSWMA), does not believe that an exclusive franchise proposal should be the only consideration for this project and urged Council to explore other options that will not be subject to the 15-month moratorium

Council discussed the current status of downtown refuse, that existing dumpsters are in violation of the Municipal Code, that the RFP process may limit the discussion of options; that further input from professional organizations should be sought, and that a contract can be written to include options

Miller moved to remove the RFP option and for city staff to work with NSWMA, the Downtown Naperville Alliance, and other appropriate groups to provide a recommendation to Council on May 19, 2009 Second, Dunn
