The Park District would like to add cameras along the Riverwalk but the locations have not determined.
- Dial stated that the agenda item addresses the infrastructure for the existing cameras which will allow them to be tied in together. He said that the Police Department will post that areas are under camera surveillance and will not be used for undercover operations. He explained recent incidents and how the cameras would have helped to solve the crimes. He said that there will be a future request for surveillance of the utility sites and there is potential for a partnership with banks in order to lower false alarm calls.
- Van Vooren stated that cameras will be added to the Chicago parking deck and will be used as a post-activity investigative tool.
- Council stated that the city manager should approve anyone who has access to view camera footage and will approve any investigations that involve use of camera video.
- Council said that they are expecting all departments to do more with less and the cameras will encourage good behavior on the part of citizens and document how government officials conduct themselves.

- Krieger explained the two areas that were corrected with the text amendment: the first was the inequity of multi-family housing where 90% received no subsidy and 10% did receive subsidy. To fix the 90% would cost the city \$2.4M but the city saves \$200,000 to correct the 10%. The second item is the difference between commercial and residential service and the city is working to correct the inequity by establishing a user fee for residential refuse pick-up.
- Leonard Kryzstoforski, 1053 W. Ogden Avenue, questioned the per-unit cost for refuse service.
- Van Vooren explained that the service is provided to single family detached homes and residential buildings comprised of four units or less and that everyone serviced by the city's residential contract will have a single service container not a collective Dumpster, which would include townhomes.

Win Wehrli, 104 S. Parkway Drive, gave a brief overview of gas station sales in Naperville in 2010. He stated that a study has shown gas sales have dropped in the last two years and by increasing the tax people will go to other communities. He said that this will burden the 31 businesses and proposed increasing the sales tax because it doesn't isolate businesses and even with an increase Naperville's tax rate would still be the lowest of the surrounding communities.

Council stated that, in addition to price, unemployment causes fewer people to commute by train or road and contributes to decreased gas sales. A chart was displayed that showed the different types of taxes that are either added on to, or are in place of a gas tax. Council said that people will continue to buy gas at locations that are convenient not because they are loyal to a particular business.

Council explained that the money collected will go directly to road maintenance, that implementing a home rule sales tax is not an option because that would raise too much money, and that other alternatives for revenues have been considered but dismissed in favor of user fees.

Council discussed maintaining some reserve until it is time to borrow for next fiscal year in order to make an informed decision to reduce borrowing or use the funds in another manner.

Council stated that it is doubtful the State of Illinois' budget will pass, that the city should plan its fiscal operations independently of the state's actions, and that the entire \$2.4M fund balance should not be used at this time.

Krieger suggested not reacting to the governor's budget proposal, that the Council should select a budget solution that will provide a year over year benefit and that some funds are being used for the downward revision of red light running revenue and the funding level of fleet services replacement expenditures. He reminded Council that the fund balance is an accrual, not a rainy day fund, and will not jeopardize the city's AAA bond rating.

Council discussed what it would take to raise property taxes.

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O NEW BUSINESS:

O1 Navistar

Wehrli discussed Navistar's recently changed business model which is a more favorable situation for the surrounding areas. Council consensus was reached directing staff to draft a resolution to send to the DuPage Forest Preserve and the Mayor and Council of the Village of Lisle stating Naperville's conditional support of the new business model.

O2 Parade Route Issues

Hinterlong directed staff to be cognizant of providing alternative traffic routes during parades and educating affected residents on those routes.

O3 Building Code Changes

Boyajian discussed building codes that will be adopted in 2012, specifically those which require single family homes to install sprinkler systems. Council directed staff to prepare a report of the substantive changes that are being proposed.

O4 Single Family Home Improvements

Boyajian discussed the permit requiring smoke detector changes for a modest remodel and asked that staff investigate a reasonable improvement threshold to trigger such a costly change otherwise people will be encouraged to not pull a permit.

Dublinski explained that the Life Safety Code requires smoke detectors be brought into sleeping rooms, be hardwired and be interconnected and has been in effect since 1996.
