Roy Corrie, 5N221 Eagle Terrace in Itasca, urged Council to keep an open mind on this topic and reserve their decision until they have seen the rules and regulations

Jason Reed, 944 Anne Road, does not support the video gaming act and urged Council to look at moral issues and to approve Option 4b

Bill Bryan, 113 N Ellsworth, discussed how fast this was approved at the state level and stated that this cannot be supervised, that is a predatory form of gambling and that municipalities will only receive 5% of the revenue

Council discussed quality of life issues if video gaming were to pass, that there isn't significant support among the eligible establishments, and that the amount of revenue is not substantial enough to approve this initiative

Council discussed the effect on self-excluded gamblers, that this is not like the lottery, video gaming is not unlike the Smoke Free initiative, the potential cost to the city to hire officers to address gaming-related problems, that 95% of revenue does not go to the city and will not help create local jobs, and challenged the state to look at cutting expenditures instead of creating more revenue

Kevin Gallaher, 1111 S Washington, President of Turning Pointe Foundation, presented autism statistics He stated that the Turning Pointe Campus would have a school facility, recreational facility, and a respite home He also stated that the Turning Pointe Foundation is consulting with national experts on autism for this project

Jack Ryan, 1204 Needles Court and President/CEO of Little Friends, discussed Little Friends programs and asked that Council reject the proposal until it is brought into compliance because no regulatory body is overseeing the services provided

Anissa Olley, 101 Springwood Drive, urged Council to support the proposal based on good land use

Council discussed licensing for residential component, impact on the school district, the recommendations of the Advisory Commission on Disabilities, the need for variance to reduce the minimum lot use, the setback from the rear of the building to the property line and additional landscaping, and asked if City ordinance mimics any of the states for a CILA license

Ely counseled that the state preempts home rule authorities on licensing, the issue before Council is land use

Laff stated that the petitioner has requested a variance to request a reduction to the minimum lot size for the schools She stated that the petitioner is proposing a 25 foot setback from the rear of the building to the property line and they will meet all screening requirements

Scott Huber, 75 E Chicago Avenue, stated his 1st amendment rights are being violated and that he is striking even though he is one person and not a crew Mr Huber stated any strike is considered an eyesore, and that there is a hostile environment in the city toward him and his strike He said that the business' loss of revenue is because of the economy not because of him

David Sinker, 21 Bunting Lane and owner of Comedy Shrine, has not been able to determine what Mr Huber is protesting and says the protest is self-serving He stated that many laws were initiated because of the actions of one person, that Mr Huber claims his tent as a business address and should be held to the same inspection and safety standards as the surrounding businesses

Council said it is time to take responsibility to protect the vitality of the downtown, focus on moving the personal belongings that encroach on and obstruct the sidewalk, and questioned the requirements regarding fire suppression and structures on public property

Dublinski responded that a permit is not required for a generator on public property. The tent permit code requires an inspection to run electrical devices inside a tent. The definitions of a structure and of a tent are gray areas in the code.

Council asked for the definition of a structure to be addressed, that the limits of the downtown area be defined, and for a specific ordinance that provides for safety.

Krieger said the final ordinance would include a map of the downtown limits.

Council asked what the process would be for clearing the area if the belongings at the protest site were left unattended.

Ely stated nothing in the code prohibits leaving personal property on public property, due process requirements need to be done before any belongings can be seized, to wholly and comprehensively address the issue a new law needs to be created, and she believes city's position will be upheld if goes to court.

Furstenau moved to conduct the first reading and table the Ordinance for passage at the October 6, 2009 City Council meeting. Second, Miller.

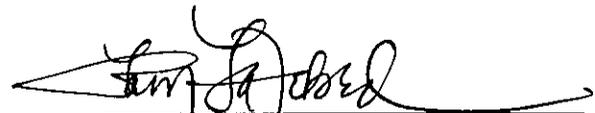
